- Study abroad to immerse yourself in the language and culture of the world's fastest-growing economy and most populous nation

Career Options and Salaries with a Chinese Major

Knowledge of a foreign language is a valuable and marketable skill. The Chinese major provides the training and cultural background needed for entering East Asia-related careers in fields such as higher education, the arts, business, government, international relations, agriculture, or the media. Knowledge of a "critical language" like Chinese is in demand within a variety of employment situations. Many people with foreign language skills work as interpreters and translators. Others work as "language specialists" in various capacities for the Federal Government. Teaching is also a popular option for students majoring in Chinese especially as the demand for Chinese language skills rises.

The median salary for interpreters and translators as of May 2015 was \$44,190 per year. Those classified as "language specialists" for the Federal Government earned an average of \$79,865 annually.

Teachers at the elementary, middle, and secondary levels earned a median salary of \$54,550, \$55,860, \$57,200 in 2015, respectively.

Declaring a Chinese Major

Chinese is not a Limited Enrollment Program (LEP). If you have decided to major in this field, you can declare immediately!

When you declare your major in Chinese, you are also declaring that you will be a student in the College of Arts and Humanities (ARHU) which houses the School of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures (of which Chinese is a part). There are two levels in your process of declaring and later advising: the department (Chinese) and the College (Arts and Humanities). The College will advise you regarding your GEN ED or CORE requirements and the Department will advise you regarding your major requirements.

To declare a major in Chinese:

- 1) You should contact Guling Hu, Undergraduate Advisor for the Department of Chinese. (See "Advising" for her contact information.) They will assist you in completing an academic plan.
- 2) Students must complete the ARHU <u>Foreign Language Placement Test</u> (FLPT must be taken in a proctored environment if students are seeking exemption from <u>The Global Engagement Requirement</u>). Please note that students' majors will not be changed until they have an FLPT score on file or have satisfied prerequisites via AP credit or earned college credit.
- 3) You will then submit a "College of Arts & Humanities Change of Major Form." This is presented to the ARHU Office of Student Affairs, along with your 4-Year Plan, in 1102 Francis Scott Key Hall (301-405-2088). You will either meet with an advisor then or make an appointment for a later meeting. Enrollment in the major is not complete until an ARHU advisor has signed the Four-Year Plan worksheet.
- 4) As a new major, you will then be assigned to a department advisor, with whom you will need to meet at least once per semester prior to registration.

Be sure to call the Arts and Humanities Office of Student Affairs at 301-405-2088 at least one day in advance in order to schedule an appointment. The Office of Student Affairs is located in 1102 Francis Scott Key Hall. Their hours are Monday – Friday, 8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

Q & A

I've heard about a Certificate in East Asian Studies. What is it and how is it different from a regular Chinese major?

The Undergraduate Certificate in East Asian Studies is designed to expand your knowledge of that region. Through 24 credits of coursework you will learn about the "cultures, histories and contemporary concerns of the peoples of China, Japan, and Korea." Such knowledge is prized by many employers and graduate schools. Upon successful completion of the curriculum you will receive a notation on your transcript.

Is there a Chinese minor?

Yes, you can declare a minor in Chinese Language which requires 15 credit hours of course work. For the Chinese Language minor you must take 12 credits of language courses at the 200-level or higher plus one linguistics-oriented course. Is it possible to get credit by taking a placement exam?

The Chinese Department does not offer credit by exam.

I've had some classes in Chinese, but my skills are a little rusty. How do I know what class to start with?

You can take a placement exam to determine which class best suits your abilities. The test takes about 90 minutes. Individualized testing is not available – you should find a way to attend one of the scheduled exams (see http://www.arhu.umd.edu/undergraduate/flpt for more information about the placement test).
