Key Features of a Community Health Major

- Learn to participate in disease prevention through health promotion and wellness programs for various communities.
- Gain the necessary skills to plan, develop, implement, and evaluate community health education programs.
- Explore a comprehensive body of knowledge and a variety of strategies and experiences that encourage professional growth and development.
- Gain the necessary skills to work in a service-oriented profession with a variety of career opportunities that can make meaningful contributions to the health and welfare of an individual and society.

Career Options and Salaries with a Community Health Major

The Bachelor of Science degree in Community Health prepares graduates for a variety of professional opportunities:

- Health Agencies -- The American Red Cross, the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, the American Lung Association, and many other health agencies employ Community Health Specialists. Job functions might include: designing and implementing educational programs, developing screening programs and community awareness programs; community outreach and service; fund raising projects to enhance educational concerns of the agency; and supervision of volunteer workers.
- Worksite Health Promotion -- With a bachelor's degree in Community Health an individual can seek employment in a variety of work related settings - corporate wellness programs, environmental worksites, HMO's, as well as hospitals and pharmaceutical companies. Health educators serve in a number of capacities - designing, implementing, and evaluating health programs in areas such as stress management, personal training, nutrition, worksite safety, and smoking cessation.
- Hospitals -- Hospital based health educators provide health promotion programs and courses to the community in many areas such as: childbirth, parenting, stress management, weight control, cancer prevention, low back pain, hypertension, diabetes, and fitness. If you are interested in public relations, media advocacy, organization and management, teaching, implementing new health oriented courses, and evaluating their effectiveness, a hospital setting may be the place for you.
- Government -- Alumni from the Community Health program have held positions at NIH within such institutes and offices such as Cancer Research; Child Health; AIDS; Heart, Lung and Blood. Other government agencies in which our alumni have held positions are the National Coalition of Hispanic Health and Human Services, Office of the Surgeon General, Office for Substance Abuse Prevention and the National Clearinghouse for Alcohol and Drugs.

- Research and Development Organizations -- Private organizations in the area (MACRO, WESTAT, Prospect Associates) employ Community Health Specialists to become involved in activities such as grant writing and program development for NIH (programs in Breast Cancer Awareness, Dental Health, Drug Abuse, Hypertension, etc.).

Salaries for Community Health graduates vary widely, depending upon the type of organization for which they work. The following are median salaries in the agencies hiring the most health educators and policy makers:

Individual and family services	\$33,740
State and Local government	\$39,240
Hospitals	\$43,530
Religious, grant making, civic organizations	\$38,190
Ambulatory health care services	\$34,740

In May 2015, the median salary for community health workers (regardless of specialty) was \$36,300 (<http://www.bls.gov/ooh/community-and-social-service/health-educators.htm#tab-1>).

Declaring a Community Health Major

- ***Community Health is not a Limited Enrollment Program. If you have decided to major in this field, you can declare immediately!***

Students interested in declaring or changing their major to Community Health must first attend a Community Health Change of Major Workshop. At this workshop, attendees will receive an orientation to the major, including degree requirements and course sequencing. After attending a Community Health Change of Major Workshop, students must attend an Academic Plan Workshop. At this workshop, students will complete an Academic Plan that outlines all the requirements they have remaining for the Community Health major.

Q & A

Does the Department of Public and Community Health offer a minor?

I've heard that I have to do an internship before I can graduate. How do I find out about that?

The semester before your internship, you will take HLTH 490 (Principles of Community Health). This class explains the requirements and helps you locate an internship that best fits your interests. You don't need to worry about the internship process until you take HLTH 490. These internships offer you the chance to gain practical experience, network, and obtain recommendations. There are a few paid internships, but most are unpaid. Many graduates receive job offers from their internships even before they graduate.
