As a Government & Politics Major

- Students gain an understanding of basic concepts of political science including power, institutions, political systems, theories of the state, political conflict, citizenship, and contending analytical and theoretical approaches
- Students become proficient in research and analytical skills using either quantitative methods or library skills
- Students acquire a basic knowledge of the methods, approaches, and theories used in accumulating and interpreting information applicable to the discipline of political science
- Students learn effective oral and written communication skills to clearly and coherently present information in the discipline of political science

Students of Government and Politics are strongly encouraged to participate in independent research with GVPT faculty members. The independent study option provides students opportunities to work one-on-one with a faculty member doing research on a topic of the student's choosing.

Career Options & Salaries with a Government & Politics Major

With a major in Government and Politics you may pursue careers in a variety of areas: public policy, research, Foreign Service, law, nonprofit (administration, public relations, fundraising) and politics (elected or appointed leadership, campaign management, staff administration). Government and Politics is also a popular major if you are interested in going to law school.

Advising

Declaring a Government & Politics Major

Government and Politics is a Limited Enrollment Program (LEP), which means that you must apply for enrollment in the major after completing certain pre-requisites, or “Gateway,” courses. However, if you are in your first semester at the University of Maryland and this is your first semester of college coursework, you can apply to transfer into Government and Politics without needing to complete the Gateway courses, as long as you complete the major change process prior to the last day of your first semester. If you are beyond your first semester, then you must complete the following requirements before applying to Government and Politics:

- 1) Complete the following two courses and earn at least a B- in each: GVPT 100 and GVPT 170 (Important: if you have earned AP credit for GVPT170, you are required to take GVPT241 and earn at least a B- in the course)
- 2) Completion of MATH111 or STAT100 with a grade of C- or higher. A calculus class (MATH220, 130, 140) with a grade of C- or higher may be substituted.
- 3) Finally, you must achieve a GPA of at least 2.7 in all college course work, calculated from your work at UMD, as well as at other institutions
- 4) Only one gateway or performance review course may be repeated to earn the required grade and that course may only be repeated once. When more than one course can satisfy a gateway requirement, taking a second course from the list will count as a repeat. **This policy will be in effect for all students who first matriculated at the University of Maryland in Spring 2015 or later.** A “W” or withdrawal counts as one attempt at a course.

Declaration Process:

In addition to the above requirements, there are a few more steps to complete your change of major. Keep in mind that Government and Politics is housed within the College of Behavioral and Social Sciences (BSOS) at the University of Maryland.

- 1) You should contact the Government and Politics advising office in order to register for a Change of Major workshop (see advising contact information above). It is recommended that you do so *before* you complete the gateway requirements to become familiar with the relevant policies. At this workshop, you will be given an application for the Government and Politics Major.
- 2) You will next complete an Academic Planning Workshop with BSOS Advising. This workshop can be completed in person or online. To register for an Academic Planning Workshop, please visit www.bsosworkshops.umd.edu. The purpose of this session is to complete an academic plan.
- 3) When you complete steps 1 and 2, turn in both the academic plan and the application to BSOS Advising at 2148 Tydings Hall.
- 4) BSOS Advising will later send an official email notifying you of your status. Please note that this will most likely take several weeks. *You will officially become a Government and Politics major the following semester.*
